ROBERT HOPE won the Oxenhope Stoop fell race for th second year - to step up his personal battle with English fell racing champion, Ian Holmes.

Holmes has dominated the event, but was pushed into secon place last year with Hope winning by 11 seconds. He was deter mined to get revenge this time, and led for most of the route. H

was ahead when they turned for home at the standing stone, but it was difficult to pick a good route off Oxenhope Moor as they raced past other runners still on their way up

Holmes held a 10-yard lead, but Hope slowly clawed his way back and as they reached the moorside cafe they were virtu-

ally neck and neck.
With about 300 yards to the tape Hope made his break and sprinted up the final climb to win by four seconds.

Hope, of the Pudsey and Bramley club finished in 28mins 51 secs - which was the second slowest winning time in the history of the race and gave an indication of the punishing conditions. Holmes finished in 28:55.

"It was one of the best races in the history of the event with Hope having to give everything to pull off the win. He was totally exhausted and almost collapsed over the winning line.

"Holmes was devastated, and I'm sure he will be even more determined to win back the title next year," said organiser Dave Woodhead.

One of the top performances of the day came from 15-yearold Bingley Harrier, Alistair Brownlee, who was given spe-cial permission to run in the Open Age event.

Despite falling heavily on the descent he made it to the finish at Penistone Hill in sixth place, taking the Under-18 title in a time of 31mins 48secs.

"It was a very gritty perfor-mance and Alistair is definately a runner to watch for the future," Woodhead said.

Local runner Colin Moses also turned in a memorable run despite finishing down in 37th place. His fell running shoe came apart on the race to the top of the moor. He stopped to pick up the sole and completed the race in his sock, with the top of his training shoe flapping round his ankle.

Irish international, Sloan of Salford, won the women's race in a time of 36:59 in 43rd position overall. She

was chased home by forme women's winner Lisa Lacor (Holmfirth) in 37:53.
