Stoop to conquer for record breakers

FAITH Biddle and Ben Lindsay set junior course records at the Stoop Fell Races at Haworth on Sunday, while a third Pendle athlete, Emma Thompson, equalled the record in her

Race organisers Dave and Eileen Woodhead went to extraordinary lengths to ensure that the races could go ahead, camping by the course in their motorhome after being alerted to the bad weather by the cancellation of the cross country at Burnley.

They were rewarded when 325 athletes showed up on Sunday morning.

The Biddles are one of the most enthusiastic fell racing families, and under eight Faith is the latest to make her mark.

Her record of 2:56 was set in the half mile race for the youngest entrants, slicing 24 seconds off the previous best with Ella Roberts of Todmorden second in 3:36. One of her prizes was to start the senior race.

All the junior races were run simultaneously and it was Emma Thompson who blazed the trail for the under 12 girls, clocking 8:10 for a mile with Rossendale Harrier Katie Ireland taking second.

It was a similar story in the under 16s, where over the same circuit Chloe Elison and Chloe Chew gave Pendle a 1-2 finish in 9:21 and 9:29 with Annie Roberts of Todmorden third.

Ben Lindsay underlined his recent form in the under 16 boys race over a two-mile circuit. Ben is the Pendle schools cross country champion in his age group and he reduced the course record here from 11:55 to 11:41.

Team mate Shaun McVitie was third in 13:24 while another Pendle runner, Anthony Langley, was third in the under 12s.

Rossendale took their second runners-up spot of the day courtesy of Grant Cunliffe in the under 14 contest.

Record times were well out of reach for the seniors with the event being run in gale force conditions but Pudsey's Rob Hope, who lives near Chorley, crossed the line in 28:57 to win the men's title for the third time.

Two East Lancashire clubs were represented in the top 10 as Todmorden's George Ehrbardt was third in 29:52 and Shane Fitzpatrick from Clayton took eighth. Blackburn Harrier Matt Nuttall was 12th, a place behind Mark Brown who took the over 40 prize for Clayton.

The same club took second and third in the over 50s thanks to Andrew Robinson and Jeff Pickup while Tod Harriers' club cham-pion Richard Blakeley won the over 60 honours.
